KC STRONG

A call to turn our collective outrage into action showcased the true power of our community. In response to the February 14th mass shooting following the Chiefs parade, United Way partnered with the Chiefs to create the KC Strong fund to quickly and responsibly deploy over \$2M in direct assistance to victims and their families, while also supporting work in the areas of violence prevention and mental health, and to assist first responders.

INFLATION RELIEF TO FAMILIES

Thanks to support from generous community donors, we delivered more than \$5.7M in direct assistance, including \$1M in prepaid debit cards averaging just more than \$900 each to individuals and families in need. While funds were not restricted, we saw the vast majority of dollars were utilized to meet basic, everyday needs including housing, clothing, food and transportation. This is on top of our ongoing commitments in the areas of eviction prevention and utility assistance.

Selected nonprofit organizations submitted applications, which were reviewed by our community investment advisory council—a diverse panel of community and business leaders over the course of several weeks. The group evaluated organizations for their demonstrated work and outcomes to address the critical challenges facing the Kansas City region today, as well as for their fiscal responsibility. Final selections were approved by the United Way Board of Trustees. Impact 100 organizations receive unrestricted funding from United Way to address their individual nonprofit's most pressing needs.

A caring team of Community Resource Navigators (CRNs) answer our community's call every single day through United Way 211. Lenetta Warren, 211 Contact Center Manager, shares her experience of lending an ear to help the thousands of Kansas Citians who reach out to 211 when they don't know where else to turn.

My life and career were going in a whole totally different direction, when the opportunity to work with 211 on a temporary basis fell into my lap. Seven years later, I'm still here because I love this environment. I love what United Way is doing through 211.

Since COVID, we've continued to see an uptick in our volume of calls. So many people continue to be impacted by high housing costs. Some are losing their homes, or are in danger of being evicted. With the right to counsel program, we've been seeing an increase of people needing help to be connected with legal representation that can help them stay in their homes, so they're not kicked out on the streets.

You learn to be really attentive while listening, understanding where they're at. They might initially call in because they can't afford rent, but as you talk with them you learn they're also struggling with maybe prescriptions or food or clothing. So what can we do to offset these other barriers?

That's why I love 211. We have an abundance of resources. If we can't give you exactly what you need, we can try to find something else that can help. We don't always know the outcome, but when we have the opportunity to follow-up, if we know we've helped even just one person that is incredibly rewarding. It's an overall sense of joy, a sense of, 'I've done something great today.'

When people give their dollars to support United Way and the work of 211, I hope they know it can really help in opening up resources that can benefit someone in need on the other end. It's a big impact. We've been around over a hundred years, so being able to give back for such a great cause, you can stand proud to know you're contributing to what we've been able to do and what I know we'll be able to do in the future.



REFRESH A CLASSROOM

Hosted by Women United

Teachers and students at Richardson & Woodland Early Learning Centers in the Kansas City, Mo. Public School District enjoyed a bright, fresh space to start the year off strong. Women United volunteers helped clean, hang bulletin board materials, and got supplies ready for students. It's a fun way to support the entire school community and promote the joys of learning.



The 3rd annual Purses for Promise event, hosted by Women United, raised \$113,000 for United Way early childhood education initiatives, including Impact 100 partner Start at Zero. More than 100 designer handbags were auctioned off. The event also included a wine pull, hat making, and networking.





Like the hundreds of Kansas City companies who partner with United Way, KC Current is leveraging United Way's expertise to amplify community engagement strategies and projects that will have lasting impact. Together, we are making volunteer opportunities available to KC Current players, staff and fans.

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

As KC Current kicked off its inaugural season in the first stadium purpose-built for a women's professional team, players appeared on the pitch wearing kits emblazoned with United Way branding. It's a multi-year partnership and an extension of United Way's status as KC Current's Official Charity Partner.

UNITED IN THE POWER OF US

This partnership is powered by our commUNITY.

A portion of every kit sold benefits United Way.

Fans can donate to support our work at every point of sale inside CPKC Stadium. United Way also receives a portion of ticket sales to all home matches. Fans can also look forward to future collaborative projects between the organizations.











February 14th, our community woke up as champions, expecting to celebrate a day in triumph with the championship Kansas City Chiefs. Instead, this day will be remembered for its tragedy.

In the immediate aftermath of the parade day shooting, United Way of Greater Kansas City and the Chiefs established a special emergency fund to support our community in its efforts to heal and become more resilient.

Over the course of 10 weeks, Kansas City's strength and generosity was apparent.

Individuals, small businesses, foundations, nonprofit and corporate partners from around the world stepped in to pledge support, raising a collective \$2 million for the KC Strong Fund.

In collaboration with the Jackson Co.
Prosecutor's Office, United Way conducted an extensive victim verification process to ensure dollars raised would be allocated to individuals who were indeed victims of the gunfire that day. Outside legal counsel was obtained to process claims and determine the amount of funds going to each victim. A total of \$1.2 million was

awarded to 20 gunshot victims, with payments ranging from \$20,000 to \$100,000 each.

We also recognize this type of violence is rampant throughout our region—often in lower-income communities far away from the spotlight of media attention. That is why funds raised from KC Strong are also benefiting violence prevention and recovery organizations, including mental health support services.

Finally, in these moments we realize just how critical it is to have brave people who run toward danger to keep us all safe. So a portion of funds was also designated to support first responders.

Fourteen community organizations received grant funding totaling more than \$831,000, thanks to your incredible kindness and giving in our community's hour of need.

Ronell Copes has been living on his own since the age of 19. He's now 33. He works two jobs, and his partner works to help keep the family afloat. They've never had trouble paying rent—until the pandemic hit.

"Everyone in our household got hit with COVID twice," Copes said. "Each time, me and my lady lost hours at work. We had cars break down. We had to figure out what bills were going to be late."

The family of six paid what it could each month toward rent, but because the balance wasn't paid in full, Ronell's landlord hit them with late fees. The first day rent was missed, there was a \$50 charge. Every day after, another \$10 was tacked on. Over time, they'd racked up thousands in late fees and were served an eviction notice in the summer of 2023.

"I felt helpless," said Copes. "It was the lowest point in my life. It was very legitimate if we got kicked out, we would have nowhere to go. It shook me to my very core."

A friend told Ronell about United Way 211. He called hoping for a lifeline and learned about our eviction prevention

initiative. Within days, funds were delivered to his landlord to cover the back due late fees and the family's eviction order was dismissed.

"I JUST NEEDED A LIFELINE, SOMEBODY TO HELP ME OUT, A FRESH START. UNITED WAY WAS ABLE TO HELP WITH THAT," COPES SAID.

He knows generous donors make this work possible, and encourages anyone who's able to support it.

"If United Way and other services didn't get their funding, families would be in chaos. We have to make sure we do whatever we can to keep these programs going," said Copes. "It could be any one of us around the corner who needs help. Your support keeps families intact."

REAL-TIME RELIEF

When area auto plants were idled back in October due to labor strikes in other parts of the country, spurring local parts shortages, United Way stepped in to help displaced members of Local Auto Workers Union 31. In partnership with Harvesters, **4200 lbs. of food was purchased to fully stock the UAW's food pantry.** An emergency assistance fund was also established with Impact 100 partner, Working Families' Friend. Many union members volunteered with United Way partners during the work stoppage.

POWERING RELIEF TO UTILITY BILL STRESS

The average customer's utility bills have gone up 20-percent in the past five years, averaging over \$200 a month. Local utility provider BPU recognizes the strain that can sometimes put on families, especially during times of extreme weather that spike bills even higher. BPU has granted United Way \$407,000 to provide relief for customers in Wyandotte Co. In 2023, the program served 1,053 households, preventing disconnection or restoring service to homes.



TACKLING THE STUDENT DEBT CRISIS

In 2023, federal student loan payments resumed for 27 million borrowers after a three-year pandemic pause. The average student owes \$35,000.

Through a United Way Worldwide initiative, in partnership with Savi and Ascendium Education, we're offering free access to Savi's online platform which can help borrowers lower monthly payments and streamline the process to apply for loan forgiveness programs. Kansas City's current Savi users are projected to save an average of \$2400 a year in student loan payments.




EASING TRANSPORTATION BARRIERS

Transportation is a major barrier for many individuals and families in maintaining financial security. Through a partnership with United Way Worldwide and rideshare operator Lyft, the Ride United program provided nearly **3,000 rides to employment, school, medical appointments, grocery stores, food pantries,** and more. The \$40,000 in grant funding to operate the program has been depleted—a testament to how great the need is for transit services in the region.



EMPOWERING FAMILIES

United Way and The Siemer Institute partner up for the Family Empowerment Initiative, along with a network of local social service agencies. The goal is to keep children stabilized in their school environment. Children with families who have a history of homelessness or frequent moves have a higher risk of adverse outcomes in their social-emotional and physical health, as well as their academic performance. Case workers pair with families to identify their needs and come up with a plan to keep them stable and housed. In 2023, we served 996 individuals, including 341 school-aged children. About 93-percent remained in school and avoided a disruptive move.



BRIGHT SMILES, HEALTHY FUTURE

Good oral health impacts your wellbeing from overall health to medical costs and quality of life. It's why we partner with Delta Dental of Kansas through its Community Benefit Program, which provides funding for low-income households to get dental care. Patients are connected to providers in the Delta Dental network and receive two years of coverage with \$3,000 in services annually for each household member. Since 2021, we've enrolled 665 participants, who've received \$1.5M in free oral healthcare.





REAL-TIME

SOLUTIONS JULIUNIS

Powered by our community, United Way recognizes the challenges facing our neighbors and finds ways to respond in real-time. In the face of higher grocery, rent and utility costs, and stagnant/slowly rising wages, United Way launched an effort to provide one-time direct inflation relief to individuals and families through prepaid debit cards.

That's how much more the average family requires to meet basic needs each month — due to rising costs of food, gasoline, healthcare, utilities, rent, and more.

"It's been a rough road," said Keisha Spears, Kansas City, Mo. mom of five. "There were a couple of days my kids actually did sleep in my car."

Family challenges and job loss put them in economic peril. But United Way 211 was there in their hour of need, getting them connected with Impact 100 partner reStart. Through our new inflation relief initiative, the family was also provided a \$1000 debit card. They're now in permanent housing.

"I HAVE A HARD TIME ASKING FOR HELP," SAID SPEARS. "HAVING UNITED WAY 211 STEP IN AND ACTUALLY CARE ABOUT ME AND MY KIDS HAS BEEN EMPOWERING."





Traci Dixon and her wife Sandra of Independence, Mo. know what it's like to be homeless, too. The couple is raising both children and grandchildren in their home. When Sandra was between jobs last year, an already tight family budget became nearly impossible when it came time to buy school supplies.

"I WAS WORRIED ABOUT NOT BEING ABLE TO PAY RENT, NOT BEING ABLE TO FEED OUR CHILDREN THE NEXT WEEK OR EVEN THE NEXT COUPLE OF DAYS," TRACI SAID. "IT'S A HORRIBLE STRESSOR."

The couple reached out to 211 and were also granted an inflation relief debit card.

"United Way — you all were angels at that time. It truly eased our minds to know people were willing to help us out," she said.

Sandra got a new higher paying job, and the family was able to move into a new home, thanks to support made possible from generous donors.

The cash assistance Tashema Bradford of Kansas City, Kan. received from United Way helped her family get back on track, as she started college classes while working part-time.

"It's been a great relief," Bradford said. "It made me want to cry.
I can actually breathe. This support has taken a huge weight off
my shoulders."

Volunteers assembled more than 1500 hygiene kits, 500 baby safety kits, 800 feminine hygiene kits, 1500 dental kits, and 3000 sack lunches for our neighbors in need. More than 4100 people participated in our volunteer opportunities.
